- The Vietnam MOIT has just <u>drafted</u> a Circular regulating the method of determining the electricity generation price and PPAs for the power plants.
- It is highly unlikely that electricity prices will go down.

Generation	 Vietnam's electricity sources in 2023 grew 3.6% year-on-year to 80,555 MW while output rose 4.56% to 280.6 billion kWh, state utility Vietnam Electricity (EVN) reported Tuesday. MOIT submitted a letter to the government regarding solutions for solving difficulties and obstacles in the implementation of gas and offshore wind power projects in PDP VIII.
Demand	 Many industrial areas face the <u>risk</u> of power shortages in 2024, which will undermine production, tenants, and investment.
Market	 Nguyen Anh Tuan, General Director of Vietnam Electricity (EVN), <u>said</u> that It is highly unlikely that electricity prices will go down given the current demand. The Vietnam MOIT has just <u>drafted</u> a Circular regulating the method of determining the electricity generation price and PPAs for the power plants.
Fuel	The \$5.4 billion Long Son Petrochemicals Complex, invested by Thailand's SCG Chemicals, <u>began</u> a full trial run last month towards commercial operations in March 2024.
Grid	The National Power Transmission Corporation (EVNNPT) will <u>commence</u> 34 electricity transmission projects and complete 63 others this year.
Planning/ others	 Industry insiders and experts <u>called</u> for long-term strategy and faster localisation for Vietnam's energy sector.
