

Viet Nam Energy Transition Weekly Update

Key points

- Vietnam & Russia <u>sign</u> deals in energy cooperation.
- Ministry of Industry and Trade (MOIT) says there is <u>insufficient</u> legal foundation to develop offshore wind power on a trial basis.
- As of 6th October 2023, 21 transitional power plants/parts of plants with the total capacity of over 1,200 MW completed COD (CommercialOperation Date) procedure.

Themes	Contents
Generation	 As of 6th October 2023, 21 transitional power plants/parts of plants with a total capacity of over 1,2 GW completed the COD (Commercial Operation Date) procedure. Petrovietnam Power Corporation (PV Power) <u>said</u> it has completed 69% of this year's profit goal before tax, with thermal power output expected to increase sharply in the coming months. The People's Committee of Can Tho City has <u>issued</u> decisions on changing the investor of two thermal power projects – O Mon III and O Mon IV.
Demand	 The successful conversion of coal power projects to liquefied natural gas (LNG) is necessary to ensure energy security and help Vietnam achieve its goal of net-zero emissions by 2050, said industry experts and insiders.
Market	 Renewable energy is <u>set</u> to create new jobs. The shift in the energy sector will lead to a change in labour structure with a need for 25 per cent of highly-skilled human resources, especially in wind and solar energy in the next 10 years.
Fuel	 The production and business activities of Vinacomin are stably <u>maintained</u>. In recent years, LNG has consistently been highlighted as a new <u>direction</u> for Vietnam's gas industry.
